THE CHICKERING-DOLMETSCH EARLY-INSTRUMENT LOG-BOOK

A Transcription with Notes

In 1905 Arnold Dolmetsch was engaged by the piano manufacturing firm of Chickering & Sons in Boston, USA, to supervise a department making early instruments, including various kinds of keyboard instruments as well as viols, lutes, and psalteries. Production started in 1906 and continued until 1910 when a financial crisis forced the company to close the early-instrument department. As each instrument was made, it was listed with its number and details of the price and first owner in a register or logbook. The keyboard instruments, regardless of type, were entered in one sequence at the start of the book; the non-keyboard instruments were recorded in a separate sequence at the back of the book.

Later the Chickering company was merged with other firms, eventually becoming part of the Aeolian-American Corporation, which ceased trading in 1985. In 1987 sixteen cubic feet of papers in 37 boxes containing the Chickering records from 1864 until closure were deposited at the Archives Center of the National Museum of American History (part of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington DC).

In the table which follows, the first six columns contain a transcription, as precise as I can make it, of the handwritten entries in the early-instrument log-book. Columns 7 and 8 give, where known:

- the date of construction (in the case of harpsichords and clavichords, as it appears on the nameboard; in the case of virginals, spinets and octavinas, as it appears elsewhere on the instrument)
- the current location of the instrument.

Column 9 gives (briefly) any other available information.

Non-keyboard instruments.

A separate sequence of numbers covers the non-keyboard instruments. Entries for them were made on two pages at the end of the log-book, instruments 1 to 16 on the page originally numbered 3185–3200, and numbers 17 and 18 on the previous page, numbered 3169–3184. The printed numbers on these pages were crossed through, as indicated below, and the new instrument numbers were written in red ink above them.
